## Patrisbrunna Peated (2017)

The Patrisbrunna Peated 2017 is a young, peated whisky from Germany, produced by the Kloster Dalheim Distillery and distributed by the independent bottler Kö13 Paderborn. With only 4 years of maturation in virgin oak casks and an alcohol content of 40%, this whisky offers a profile that should be of particular interest to lovers of straightforward, peaty flavours.

### TASTING NOTES

#### NOSE

The Patrisbrunna Peated shows its intense side from the very first nosing. A strong portion of smoke dominates the flavour, accompanied by clear medicinal notes reminiscent of iodine. Behind this, the youth of the whisky comes to the fore, supported by a light oak note that is gently softened by caramel and vanilla. A hint of malt rounds off the overall picture, with the flavours coming across as classic but unsurprising.

#### PALATE

On the palate, the Patrisbrunna Peated unfolds an unusual interplay of buttery soft and extremely dry textures. The flavour is initially reminiscent of vinegar and rubber tyres, which brings a certain originality to the fore. The tongue sensation is almost powdery, which gives the whisky an interesting but also challenging flavour.

#### FINISH

The classic, long peat finish remains present, but without the spicy depth familiar from other smoky whiskies. A slight saltiness brings additional complexity, but overall the finish remains rather restrained and not very spectacular.

### THOUGHTS

#### MARCEL

A whisky that scores with its smoky straightforwardness but remains a bit too tame. The Patrisbrunna Peated 2017 is like the buddy who's always there but rarely surprises you – solid, uncomplicated, and with a touch of peat that's enjoyable but not captivating.

#### SASCHA

The Patrisbrunna Peated 2017 impresses with a clear structure and a dominant smoky note, but feels somewhat unbalanced in terms of complexity and finish. For fans of straightforward, peaty German whiskies, it's a reliable, if not very nuanced, option without any extraordinary character.
